# COMMUNITY ORIENTED POLICING OUTLINE

The Park City Police Department is committed, through Community Oriented Policing, to creating partnerships with the community, our visitors and guests, in an effort to protect and enhance the character of our town, our quality of life and the visitor experience within Park City.

The department has, over the last several years, developed and implemented programs that have provided opportunities for a higher degree of interaction with the community in a variety of ways. Addressing issues and concerns within the community that are not specifically crime related, but are perhaps more related to community identity and quality of life and are specifically directed toward prevention rather than reaction, has been the direction the department has been moving slowly but consistently.

This outline contains a listing of those department programs that are currently in place, and those programs that are still being developed or are near completion and provides a look at the direction the department is heading.

## CURRENT PROGRAMS:

### Traffic Calming Task Force Participation

The Community Outreach Officer is a member of the Traffic Calming Task Force and works closely with members of other departments to address traffic related issues such as new sign placement, specific enforcement requests, traffic control device placement, etc.

### School Resource Officer

The School Resource Officer Program dedicates a full-time police officer to work solely with issues at the four schools that are within Park City to ensure the safety of the students and staff at each school while promoting a positive learning environment for students of the district.

### Drug Disposal Program

Citizens are encouraged to use the receptacle located in the foyer of the Police building rather than flush medications down drains and toilets in order to keep these medications out of the waterways.

### Special Needs/Mental Health Outreach

The goal of this program is to insure the safety of an individual with special needs/mental illness in a crisis situation. The program promotes proactive communication allowing police, fire and medical services quick access to essential information of a person with special/mental illness. The survey is a list of information regarding the individual, to include name, birthdate, physical description, known triggers, behaviors, and most importantly, calming methods. Having this information prior to a crisis situation (cont.>

will improve response times and reduce confusion, allowing responding personnel to be better prepared when arriving on scene to assist. The outreach program is accomplished by a member with special needs/mental illness, or the adult parent or legal guardian of an individual with a special needs/mental illness. Once the information is submitted, a certified Crisis Intervention Officer will review the submitted information. Correspondence may be needed for further information.

### Sports Equipment Registration

Owners of skis, snowboards and bicycles fill out a short registration form and place a small sticker on their equipment. In the event the equipment is stolen advise the police department that the equipment is registered. The serial number will be placed on the stolen property list of the NCIC. The program is 100% free. The Park City Police Department provides all forms and stickers.

### Property Watch Program

If you are traveling or planning to be away from your home, take advantage of the Park City Police Department's Property Watch Program. The PWP is a police service we offer to our citizens on vacation or temporarily away from their home. Our Officers will conduct periodic inspections of your property to ensure the residence is secured. Property Watch requests are conducted for a maximum of 2 weeks at a time, unless special circumstances exist. If you would like to request a Property Watch or need further assistance, please contact the Park City Police Department Community Outreach Office.
